9	ourselves about the great mission of our organization.
10	And I was hoping if everyone can join Stan, and you

24	MS. KATHY KRAMER: Good. Thank you.
25	Good morning. We finalized our 2015 year-end

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1 financial results, and I'd like to share them with you
  at this time.

              We finished --
          MS. REGGIE MUNDEKIS: We're having trouble

          MS. KATHY KRAMER: Okay. Thank you.
10
              I want to share our results from the 2015
11 year end. We finished 2015 at $39 million in revenue.
12 That was an increase of $1.4 million from 2014.
13 extremely proud of our team to announce that 1.3 of that
14 million was a result of our increased year-round event
15
  sales.
16
              And as you can see, when you have more event
  sales, you're going to be parking more vehicles, and
17
  that helped increase that revenue by 500,000, as well as
18
  some VIP. So that was the revenue side.
19

              Next slide, Jessica.
21
              The operating expenses were 30.9 million.
22 That was an increase of 2.7 over the expenses of 2014.
23
  Expenses across the board in 2015 were increased, and
24
  that was in support -- if you all remember, we
  celebrated our 125th anniversary celebration -- to
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additional programming and around activities around that 1 2 celebration. 3 Next slide. The 2015 year-end results as a comparison to 4 2014. You can imagine when you have 2.7 million more in 5 expenses how it shakes down to the bottom line. 7 a decrease of 1.5. However, with the -- it was offset by the increase of the event sales. So we did realize a 1.5 less net income over 2014. 10 Okay. Next. Okay. How did 2015 actuals compare to the 2016 budget? 2016 budget year-to-date 11 12 net income, we have budgeted for 2.6 million in net This is -- this is a decrease year over year. 13 income. 14 If you remember from our budget 15 presentations, well over \$3 million is being reinvested 16 back into the organization. One million of that is for 17 participation in the Arlington bioswale project. We are 18 reinvesting in civil servant positions and capital expenses, and that brings it to a -- to the \$2.6 million 19 20 for the net revenue projections. 21 The next cash slide, Jessica. Okav. 2.2 That's always an important number. Cash. 23 Cash at the end of the year of 2015 is over \$30 million. 24 That was increased by 3 million from 2014. So you can see despite some reinvestment celebrating our 125th

anniversary that we still hold a strong cash position. 1 2 So any questions? Okay. All right. Moving 3 on. 4 Our legislative representative, the firm Gonsalves & Sons, continues to make progress on getting 5 6 AB4X22 repealed. Assemblymember Daly has introduced repeal language on bill AB 1907. In addition, Daly has reached out to the Orange County delegation asking them to coauthor the bill. Because the Constitution requires 10 all bills be in print for 30 days prior to being heard, it's not eligible to be heard until March 11. 12 Gonsalves continues to have conversations 13 with the State Department of finance, and they are indicating their support for this bill. So all is moving well along in the repeal of that sale. We are 15 16 very excited about that progress. 17 At this time, I'd like to turn it over to 18 Michele Richards, VP of Business Development, to tell us about what's going to be happening this next month at 19 the OC Fair & Event Center. 20 21 MS. MICHELE RICHARDS: All right. Thank you very much. Before we look at what's coming up at OC Fair & 2.2 23 Event Center in March, I wanted to go back to something 24 that Kathy highlighted regarding the contributions of our year-round events program not only to the bottom

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1 line, but to the growth of the organization.
 2
              Just to point out, a couple of facts and
 3 figures since 2009, our events program has grown from
 4 $4.1 million in revenue to 6.6 million at the close of
  2015. That represents a 61 percent growth rate in six
 5
  years. And I know a lot of our discussion on a monthly
  basis is centered around the fair, the annual fair, but
  I think that's a phenomenal story to tell.

              And I wanted to take a minute to recognize
  the team that is responsible for those achievements.

13 here, is our new event supervisor, but our immediate

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MS. MICHELE RICHARDS: Would you please stand 1 2 too? 3 Roy just celebrated his five-year anniversary here at the OC Fair. 5 (Applause.) 6 MS. MICHELE RICHARDS: Okay. Let's see what's 7 coming up in March. First of all, in just a week or so from now, 8 Musink will make its appearance again here at the 10 OC Fair & Event Center. It's a three-day tattoo convention, car show, and live music concert with over 11 12 300 world-renowned tattoo artists and hundreds of 13 vendors, Friday, March 4, from 3:00 to 10:00, Saturday the 5th from noon to 10:00, and Sunday the 6th from noon to 9:00. Price of admission is \$45 or you can get a 15 16 three-day pass for \$120. Our gardening classes continue at Centennial 17 If you're interested in learning all about home 18 Farm. grown tomatoes, you should come on March 12 from 9:30 to This class will help you easily begin growing 20 noon. great tomatoes at home. You'll learn all about soil, containers, raised beds, and backyard gardens. 22 23 Once you take the class on the 12th, you can come back again on the 19th for the advanced home grown 25 tomato class. It's aimed at experienced growers, and

1 you'll learn some advanced skills like pruning, 2 pollination, and mulching. The cost is \$5, and that's 3 to cover the cost of materials for the class. 4 And then the weekend of March 12 and 13, we 5 will, once again, host the Radio Control & Hobby Expo, 6 RCX, Saturday the 12th from 10:00 to 5:00 and Sunday the 7 13th from 10:00 to 4:00. Join thousands of radio control and action technology activists as they gather to discuss the latest and greatest new products. Price 10 of admission is \$15 to that event. Then on March 16th, Wednesday, March 16th, we 11 will, once again, welcome Orange County's Largest Mixer 13 from 5:00 to 9:00 p.m. This is the ultimate business 14 networking event. It's hosted by several Chambers of Commerce throughout Orange County and various business 15 16 organizations. Admission is \$20. 17 And we'll welcome back again our long-time Crossroads of the West Gun Show. It's a two-day gun and 18 western Americana show March 19 from 9:00 to 5:00 and 19 20 Sunday, March 20th, from 9:00 to 4:00. 21 And then rounding out March will be the 22 Easter celebration in the Pacific Amphitheater. It's 23 open to the public, free admission. Good Friday celebration on March 25th from 7:00 to 9:30, and Easter Sunday sunrise service March 27th from 6:00 to 10:00,

1 and that's hosted by Calvary Chapel. Events that are held every week here at the 2 3 OC Fair & Event Center, just a reminder to all that Centennial Farm is free to the public, open Monday through Friday, 1:00 to 4:00, Saturdays and Sundays from 5 9:00 to 4:00. And, of course, the Orange County Marketplace takes place Saturdays and Sundays from 7:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., and that includes Cars & Coffee held every Saturday from 7:00 to 9:00. So if you enjoy cars, that's definitely the event to go to. 10 Our double dose of gourmet food trucks 11 happens Wednesday for dinner from 5:30 to 9:00 and then 13 on Thursdays for lunch from 11:00 to 2:00 in front of the Pacific Amphitheater at the box office. 15 And accompanying the food trucks on 16 Thursday -- every Thursday from 9:00 to 1:00 is the 17 Farmers Market. So plenty of things happening at the OC Fair & Event Center in March. 19 MS. KATHY KRAMER: Thank you, Michele, for that great update, and thanks to the team. That's tremendous 21 year-round growth. 2.2 Last month I shared with you that we were 23 selected to participate in the California State University Fullerton Student Consulting Program, and we 25 had our first meeting with the six-member student group

1 and their professor. Staff provided a tour of Centennial Farm and 2 3 provided an overview of our agricultural initiatives. 4 They will begin working on helping us identify additional agricultural opportunities and are planning 5 to create an agricultural education demand-and-supply study -- I'm glad they're doing it. They're MBA students -- along with creating a SWOT analysis for us with projected completion date end of May. 10 We're excited to be working with them. of them had not even been to Centennial Farm, and I know 11 12 we created some new fans with those students. 13 Although fair is just over four months away, the H.R. team is busy hiring seasonal fair staff. During March and April, last year's seasonal staff are 15 16 contacted and provided the opportunity to return to work at the 2016 fair. 17 18 We remain having a historically high -- we 19 have about a 70 percent return rate from our seasonal 20 employees. So we're looking forward to having those join us for '16. Once this process is completed, any unfilled positions are recruited from the local market. 22 23 So if you have a family member sitting on the couch or 24 with no plan for the summer, direct them to our website to see a list of our fairtime job opportunities.

1	Speaking of fair, some highlights from the
2	Pac Amp concert entertainment lineup, for those of you
3	Styx fans, you better be getting in the race. Styx is
4	racing toward a sellout with 5300 tickets sold.
5	The Ziggy Marley/Steel Pulse show went on
6	sale this week and sold 1200 tickets in the first hour
7	of presale. They'll be performing two shows this year.
8	Our Super Pass continues to be popular. To
9	date we've sold 3,780 passes, which represents a
10	15 percent increase to date over last year.
11	We will be participating in the California
12	Ag. Day in Sacramento on March 16. For those of you not
13	familiar with that event, it's a celebration
14	California annual celebration of California's diverse
15	agriculture community. It will provide an opportunity
16	to interact with state agriculture agency and commodity
17	groups. So we're looking forward to continuing looking
18	for opportunities there.
19	And that concludes my report. I'm happy to

1 for general comments and three that are specific to So we'll then proceed with the general agenda items. comments. And then as we get to the agenda items, we'll call on those public comments. 5 The first one in the order I received them is Reggie Mundekis. You have three minutes. 7 MS. REGGIE MUNDEKIS: Thank you. Good morning. 8 The Board of Directors of the 32nd DAA, a state agency, is requested to release the work history 10 and credentials of Vice President of Operation Ken The Vice President of Operations is responsible 11 Karns. 12 for the health and safety of all people using the 13 property under jurisdiction of this Board. 14 The job duties include, but are not limited to, security compliance with all federal, state, and 15 16 municipal laws, building and fire codes, watershed 17 management, CEQA, workplace safety, and the four legal settlements binding the 32nd DAA. There are additional 18 aspects to this job. 19 20 The health and safety of all people on the 21 property rely upon the credentials and training of the 22 Vice President of Operations. Release of the work 23 history of Ken Karns is in the public interest and 24 delineated in Government Code 6255. This is the second 25 request for these documents.

1 The release of the work visa of Ken Karns is 2 requested. Ken Karns has spent his entire education and working career in Canada and has been described as a Canadian by CEO Kathy Kramer. A work visa is needed for a foreign national to work in the United States. 5 Work visas have terms and conditions placed 6 7 upon them. Public money may have been spent to procure 8 said work visa. The 32nd DAA Board appears to agree to displace a qualified American worker by hiring a foreign 10 worker to take a State of California Civil Service 11 position. 12 Release of the work visa file is in the 13 public interest of the people of California as 14 delineated in Government Code 6255. This is the second 15 request for these documents. The release of the work history and 16 credentials for the Director of Technology and 17 18 Production Jason Jacobsen is requested. The duties of the Director of Technology and Production include, but 19 20 are not limited to, the safe installation of equipment 21 used during events, including, but not limited to electrical equipment, trusses, rigging, overhead lights, 22 23 overhead speakers, sun shades, signs, overhead 24 projection systems, overhead video screens, and stages. 25 The job also includes management of the IT

1 network, including, but not limited to, networking, cybersecurity, Wi-Fi, e-commerce, system design, 3 implementation, and management. 4 This position is responsible for compliance with the four settlements which bind the 32nd DAA along 5 with compliance with all state, federal, and municipal 7 laws. There are additional aspects to this job. 8 The health and safety of all people on the property rely upon the credentials of training of the 10 Director of Technology and Production. Release of the work history of Jason Jacobsen is in the public interest 11 12 as delineated in Government Code 6255. This is the 13 second request for these documents. 14 When will the public be given this 15 information? Will the public receive this information today? And, please, will Mr. Karns please let us know 16 what type of work visa he is on? Thank you. 17 18 CHAIR GERARDO MOUET: Thank you, Reggie. Roy Englebrecht. 19 MR. ROY ENGLEBRECHT: Thank you, Board. 20 21 I would be remiss if I didn't call your 22 attention again to the outstanding staff you have here 23 at the fair. A week ago tonight we kicked off our sixth 24 year of Fight Club OC shows with a sold-out crowd. Great evening. We celebrate five years of being here.

1 And at 3:30, Jenn Olvera called me in the box office, said, "Roy, we need you to come out here." As I 3 walked out and went towards the screen area, there was, 4 like, 20 people from the fair walking there. 5 Wondering what's going on? This is kind of strange. And there they had a giant cake and with our 6 Fight Club OC logo and fifth anniversary. And we cut it and shared it with all those people sitting on the back row, Howard and Juan and Linda and Jenn and Jerry and so 10 forth. So, again, this is something they didn't have 11 to do. It made me feel very good and appreciative for 12 the five years that we've been here. So, Board, you 14 have some good people here. Thank you. 15 CHAIR GERARDO MOUET: Thank you, Roy. 16 And Beth Refakes, please. MS. BETH REFAKES: Beth Refakes, Costa Mesa 17 resident. 18 19 I wanted to thank Kathy for mentioning the 20 AB 1907 bill. We're happy to see that there's something 21 being done and moving forward. And whatever the community can do to support it when it gets to that 22 23 point, I'm sure that you'll see a lot of residents speaking in favor of having that sale clause rescinded. 25 The other thing I had is the status of the

1 gun show. I'm happy to see that you're having it again 2 in March, and I hope that the -- if there is any 3 intention of discontinuing that, that it is brought before a public forum for discussion. 5 And the other thing, I know that you mentioned that -- Kathy mentioned about the concerts for the fair. I just want to make sure that the sound monitoring and neighborhood ambassador programs that were in place last year will continue with the 2016 fair 10 because it seemed to be very successful, and a lot of residents seemed to be happy with it. Thank you. 11 12 CHAIR GERARDO MOUET: Thank you, Beth. 13 All right. That concludes the general public comments. And so we're going to move on to our agenda, and the other three public comments I'll call on when --16 when the agenda item -- when we arrive to that specific 17 agenda item. I believe the next item is the review of 18 minutes.           CHAIR GERARDO MOUET:
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1 MS. KATHY KRAMER: The contract is a two-year sponsorship contract with three one-year options for 3 renewal for Pepsi to be the exclusive year-round carbonated soft drink sponsor. The new agreement more 5 than doubles the annual sponsorship fee from 21,000 to 50,000. In addition, they provided a 20 percent higher rebate on products sold. So the team did a great job negotiating a long-term contract. 9 CHAIR GERARDO MOUET: Yes. DIRECTOR DOUGLAS LA BELLE: Chair Mouet, if I 10 might, my usual pitch on this, my wife and I own 120 12 shares of Pepsi out of 1.5 billion outstanding, so I 13 don't think we have a significant impact. I just want 14 to disclose that. 15 CHAIR GERARDO MOUET: That's a nice -- nice 16 comfort thing when in your retirement -- the -- I'm 17 always reminded of when Steven Jobs was recruiting for 18 the new CEO that was coming from Pepsi, Sculley -- I 19 don't know if you remember -- for Apple. And Steven said, "Do you want to continue selling sugar water for the -- to the world, or do you want to change the 22 world?" But the good thing is that it's always great to 23 have a turkey leg in some sugar water. So that's great 24 news. 25 Is there any other items that --

              I'm calling on Bryan Arnold. And you have

          MR. BRYAN ARNOLD: Thank you. My name is Bryan
13 Arnold. I'm a lawyer with Gordee, Nowicki & Blakeney.
14 I'm here to talk about the Emergency Medical Technician
  contract that's on your Consent.
15
16
              I represent Medical and Safety,
17 |Incorporated -- (indiscernible) -- contract that has
18 been there for ten years. I'm not here to make a legal
19 argument. I'm here to make a practical argument.
20 here to suggest to you that you should not award this
21 contract because essentially it was awarded without
22 competition.
              There were three bidders who submitted
23
24 proposals in response to the RFP. Two of those bidders,
25 Medical and Safety and Joffe Emergency Services, were
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- 1 rejected, rejected for failing to comply with the
- 2 Disabled Veteran Business Enterprise requirement.
- 3 That's a policy that's designed to promote, encourage --
- 4 (indiscernible) -- contract. It's a subcontract with
- 5 DVBE services.
- 6 It really had application on this contract
- 7 because the bulk of the work performed is services. And
- 8 the services under this contract were to be provided
- 9 only by the contractor. There was no subcontractor
- 10 allowed for those services.
- 11 So what happened was that West Coast
- 12 submitted a form that said no subcontract. The other
- 13 bidders failed to submit that form. It's a new
- 14 requirement for us. We failed to submit the form that
- 15 said no subcontracting. Our proposals were rejected,
- 16 leaving West Coast standing.
- Now, why is that important? It's important
- 18 because West Coast's proposal was not tested through
- 19 competition, and it is remarkably unrealistic. Medical
- 20 and Safety bid \$21 an hour for the services. Joffe bid
- 21 \$22 an hour for the services for the first year. West
- 22 Coast bid \$14.50, almost \$7 below what was really a
- 23 recognized price.
- Now, this rate, the hourly rate is
- 25 all-encompassing. They have to provide all the

1 services, all the equipment, all the vehicles, run their 2 business, everything for that price. It can't be done. 3 The pricing is so out of line with the 4 industry that it puts the entire contract and the performance at risk. We're talking you think about 5 yourself. You go in for a procedure for a doctor, and 6 7 two, three, four doctors said a similar price, and someone comes in way below that. You're going to say "What's going on?" That's what happened in this case. 9 10 The price is so far out of line with the competing prices that -- that there is no incentive for 11 12 them to really have the most experienced personnel, to 13 really have a cushion to apply for any emergency repairs or anything that might be done and really have the flexibility you're entitled to. 15 And let me give this example. The minimum 16 wage is now \$10 an hour. If they have to have any 17 overtime on this contract -- well, for the lowest person 18 to have -- on the totem pole, plus to pay \$15 an hour 19 for that person, that is more than they're going to 21 receive from the county for that service. 2.2 So there's the risk to you and to the public 23 for this very important contract. It's very real. For that reason, because there was no competition 24 essentially, I urge you to reject this contract and

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1 direct the staff to have a new competition to provide
  for these services. It's really that important.

23 since 2012. Prior to that, the last increase was in
24 2005 and 2009 in which a 1 percent point increase was
  taken for each of these periods.

              Currently, San Diego County Fair
  commission -- concessionaire commission is 25 percent,
 3 and the L.A. County Fair ranges from 26 to 30.
  commission increase would contribute in offsetting
  increased operation costs and support increased
 5
  marketing efforts.
              All 2016 concessionaire contracts would be a
 7
  template document reflecting this increase if the Board
  elects to move. The recommendation is to increase the
10 2016 concessionaire commission from 24 percent to
11
  25 percent.

1 I'm very passionate about this. I'm very passionate about it. I think if you read, again, Gavin 3 Newsom's book about this whole issue, I think it opens 4 our -- opens everyone's eyes. And I'm gonna keep 5 repeating it. The use of state property is -- is a 6 7 privilege. This is not something that anybody owes anybody. It's a privilege. To take the property of the taxpayers of the state of California and use it to make 10 money, that's a privilege. It's not a right. It's not 11 like "Oh, you owe me this" or "Yeah, we got to have" --12 no. That's a privilege. 13 And I think we're learning this is a very --14 and I'm going to be very clear about this. The fair 15 business is a very complicated business in a lot of There's long-term relationships that exist 16 ways. 17 between a lot of people. There's all kinds of things that play into this. 18 And I -- for us, I want to say, you know, 19 20 most of the concessionaires are fine. I have to say that Spectra is outstanding. I mean if you want to look 22 at a model of people who give back to this community, 23 people that understand and appreciate the idea of this 24 being public property and that it's their obligation, 25 it's their obligation in some ways for the use of this

1 property not only to pay a fair amount for use of the 2 property, but also to be part of the community's 3 well-being. I think we have other concessionaires that 4 take the money and run. And I mean you can only look at 5 their prices. And people in this fair community in the fair business don't like it. They don't like the appearance because it's kind of been a cultural thing. 9 I don't like it. I don't like it at all, and 10 I'm gonna keep pushing. I wish -- I wish that the board members at L.A. County Fair would have been much more 12 diligent, much more aggressive about digging into this 13 business. 14 So I think we want to look to a model 15 concessionaire, we should look at Spectra. 16 from -- in terms of my opinion. It's not the Board's 17 opinion. I'm sure everybody has their own opinion about 18 it. But that's -- that is a true public/private 19 partnership, not a "Guess what? We get to use your 20 property, and we're gonna make -- we're gonna take 21 millions out of here each year, and we'll give you the 22 basic minimum that we can give you and we'll toss a few 23 other little extras around for some other things." 24 That's not what the use and the spirit of 25 public property is about. It really isn't. And if

1 there's a place to discuss -- discuss this whole issue of public and private space and private partnerships to 3 find real improvement, something that -- from what I 4 read in the L.A. County thing and from what I've seen 5 here, this is a great place to start. And public space is a very, very difficult issue. Go to Portland, Oregon, and see. 7 8 middle of their financial district, they got a big park, a big public park. Try to put that in the middle of the 10 financial district in Orange County and see what happens. So it's a big issue. We got a lot of 11 improvement to do here, a lot of improvement. And --12 13 and I'm gonna push it. I'm not getting up off of this. 14 So thank you to Stan, really. A marvelous job. A great job. You know, very, very smart how Stan 15 16 and Barbara approached it. They were very diligent 17 about it. They were careful. They were -- they were 18 very -- I mean they did it in a very level-headed way, 19 not trying to take a big bite, not trying to, you know, 20 do that kind of thing. So great job. 21 Spectra -- you're here, Nick, and that's why 22 I'm bringing you up. Great job. I mean you're always 23 there for us. Always. No argument, no discussion. 24 we can help advance the public space, he's there to do 25 it, and I think that's marvelous. So thank you very

much. 1 Stan, great job. 2 3 DIRECTOR STAN TKACZYK: Thank you, Nick. 4 VICE CHAIR NICK BERARDINO: Other concessionaires, at least with this Board Member, you 5 6 never have to worry about me stabbing you in the back. Maybe stabbing you in the chest, but you don't have to worry about me stabbing you in the back. 9 And I'll tell all of you with this particular 10 Board Member, think about it, your increased participation in making this place a better place for 12 the citizens that own it. Think about it and think 13 very, very hard about it. 14 And on that, I would with congratulatory to 15 Stanley and to Barbara, I move this item. CHAIR GERARDO MOUET: 16 Stan? DIRECTOR STAN TKACZYK: Okay. Nick, thank you 17 very much. I just want to share with you some of the 18 19 process that we went through. It -- Barbara Bagneris 20 was a very big part of that. Go talk to our own legislators who are 14 hearing about it. 15 This is a business that needs -- this is a 16 thing where we have some very good people. We have other people that are smash-and-grab people. As much as 17 I can get, I'm gonna get, and I'm gonna jack them up and 18 jack up the prices to cover everything I can. 19 20 That's how this -- I mean -- and let's not 21 kid ourselves because I'm starting -- because I'm --22 I'll get heated on this because it makes me sick when I 23 think of the L.A. County Fair, a venue, and our fair. 24 Kids -- this is for our community. These are children. 25 And some of these prices, I mean it's so, so expensive.

- 1 It's expensive. And I get hit with that all the time
  2 every time I've been -- every year I've gotten on the
  3 Board.
  4 And I think there's a lot of lessons if you
- And I think there's a lot of lessons if you read the entire investigation or talk to the people involved in that investigation in L.A. County. Take a real good look at that and, you know, look at some of these -- some people say, "Oh, we're losing people because of the weather." That is true. True. No question.
- This is a weather-sensitive business, and if it gets too damn hot, who wants to go to the fair, you know? I don't. And I'm -- half the time I'm thinking "This is a hot day. Man, whoee." I got to be here.

  I'm saying -- and I can see -- so I understand that.
- That's not the big deterrent, though. Who's kidding who? Come on. I'm so tired of this because what it is is it's so expensive to come here. That's what kills the attendance. And if you don't think so, then you ain't thinking. You don't think so, then I'll tell you what.
- I will ask this -- anybody that disagrees
  with that, let's do a poll and maybe -- I like to put
  that on the next thing. I want to do a poll, a real
  poll with real pollsters, and let's find out is it the

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1 weather or is it that we're getting killed and the
 2 public is getting killed with these prices these people
 3 are charging? You want to poll it? Anybody?

                                       Stan and then Doug.
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1 DIRECTOR STAN TKACZYK: I'm gonna say Nick's comments are very well received. And I think the 3 vendors, I hope you understand the balance that we're trying to achieve here at the fair. 5 And you're businesspeople. I think what he said is very realistic to a businessman, and there is that fine balance that keeps you in business and that fine balance that can knock you out of business very quickly. And it can turn on a dime. 10 And we have been able to enjoy a very successful event for some time, but we need to be very 11 12 sensitive to the issues as Board Members. As I -- as 13 Nick has brought up over the last four years that I've 14 been on the Board, really the number one comment that 15 continually comes back to me is the pricing that we 16 have. And that's the number one comment. 17 Being on this committee as I was, staff went out and reviewed the pricing in all the other venues that are out there. And I can say to you by the 19 recommendation that we're making today that we are very 21 competitively priced in the market that we are in. 2.2 The other fairs, the other -- none are -- we 23 were the lowest. Now we're going to be there with the 24 lowest but not the lowest. We were 24. Others were 25, 26, 27. So we're just bringing ourselves up to that

number. 1 2 So my comment about pigs playing in the mud and hogs get slaughtered, I never want to become a hog because your days are numbered very quickly. 5 And I think what Nick has brought up, it needs to be echoed to everyone here in this room, the vendors and ourselves too. We cannot price ourselves out of the market. It works on both sides. 9 So I think -- I know we have a Board that is 10 sensitive to all of the pricing, our pricing, your 11 pricing. And I think what we have on the table should 12 be approved. 13 CHAIR GERARDO MOUET: Doug? 14 DIRECTOR DOUGLAS LA BELLE: Well, I concur with 15 Nick. I might say it a little differently, but I 16 definitely concur with Nick that we want our 17 concessionaires to make a reasonable profit, but we need 18 to be very sensitive to those who attend the fair. We 19 want it to be a good family experience that's affordable 20 for everybody. 21 And I, as one, certainly do not want to see this increase passed on in any way to -- to those who 22 23 attend the fair. I'll just leave it at that. 24 CHAIR GERARDO MOUET: Yeah. Let me make -- I 25 have a comment.

The -- you know, I'm reminded of a classic 1 Charles Dickens novel, "A Tale of Two Cities." This is the tale of two county fairs, L.A. and Orange County. 4 We all know that many of our vendors also go to L.A., and they go to Del Mar, L.A. So, therefore, we should 5 study Del Mar and L.A. because there's that common 7 ground. And the L.A. County Fair is actually helping us look better because we're going to be -- we are the 10 leaders. Look at the way we're heading with regards to the Assembly Bill that -- that's going to put the 11 12 final -- I believe the final nail in the coffin in the 13 sales controversy and the Board's emphasis on transparency, on public dialogue. And it's great to see the contrast, you know, the horror of what L.A. is going 15 16 through. And so I also want to thank, though, because 17 18 I know how this -- I know how you truly improve things. 19 It's not just the Board. It's not just a passionate 20 Board Member. It's essential to have the passion. essential to have the policymakers give the right vision and the right direction so that we can be -- so we can 22 23 excel. But staff have to be there, as well, because 24 they're the ones that get paid to get into the weeds.

1 They're the ones that are professional to get into the weeds and provide us and respond to the direction that 3 we're doing. And there needs to be this mutual understanding and working well together, and that's good That's good teamwork. 5 teamwork. So I -- I think this is an excellent lesson 6 7 for us to continue doing the right thing for the public. 8 That's why we're here. And so I think -- make no 9 mistake about it that the people that come and do 10 business at our site also do business in L.A. and 11 Del Mar, and so they're very much understanding what 12 they can do. But we know that the Orange County Fair is 13 a very successful fair for a lot of people. 14 why we get a great attendance. We have a great 15 location. 16 And so, anyway, I think this is a really good thing and that I -- I'd like to thank staff again for 17 the awesome work that they've done, thank the committee, 18 Stan and Barbara, and Nick for his vision on making sure 19 that we focus on -- on this important issue. 20 21 So I think there's been a motion and a 2.2 second. 23 DIRECTOR SANDRA CERVANTES: Correct. 24 CHAIR GERARDO MOUET: And so, Jessica, could you call for the vote?

16 staff's going to present, but let me kind of introduce
  the item because I want to remind the Board that I was
17
18 very enthusiastic in suggesting to the Board that it's
19 an important thing, in my opinion, for the OC Fair &
20 Event Center to have a really good relationship with its
21 partner foundations, its partner nonprofits, is to have
22 a written agreement.
23
              There is nothing like having a written
24 agreement in order to truly understand roles and
  obligations, and there's no -- there's no need to try to
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1 remember what was discussed during a handshake and a year or two previously, and staff change and Board 3 Members change and one forgets. 4 So I feel very, very important that -- I think it's very important for -- for having a good 5 Memorandum of Understanding between the OC Fair & Event Center and Centennial Farm Foundation, and staff is 8 working on bringing to us when it's ready for Heroes Hall, because I think that is really the -- the best 10 practice in these types of situations with regards to an organization having a partnership with a foundation or a 11 12 nonprofit. 13 So with that, I know I've read the summary, 14 and now Michele's going to give us a little bit of a summary because then she and I are going to go to the 15 Centennial Farm Foundation today at 3:30 and introduce 16 the draft to them so that their board can review it 17 because you can't vote on it unless both parties have 18 reviewed and understand it. So we're heading on the 19 20 right direction, I think. 21 That's my intro. I'll pass it to Michele. MS. MICHELE RICHARDS: Okay. So this is an 2.2 23 information item only. It's really to just go over some of the highlights of the draft MOU. You have a copy of that draft MOU in your packet, but I'll just point out a

1 few things. 2 Staff has been working with legal counsel to 3 develop this MOU. They have reviewed it. It's now 4 ready for review by this Board. And as Chair Mouet said, we will be taking it to the Centennial Farm 5 Foundation board later this afternoon for their review. 7 But just a couple of highlights. 8 Really, the purpose of the MOU is to provide a framework for the OC Fair & Event Center and the Centennial Farm Foundation to work together on mutually 10 agreed upon goals for fundraising and support of 11 12 Centennial Farm. 13 The term of the MOU is for a five-year 14 period. It will be automatically extended for an additional five years unless terminated or amended by 16 either party. 17 Some of the key obligations for the district will be to communicate our long-term plans for Centennial Farm, to act as the sole operator of 19 Centennial Farm, including having the -- the exclusive 21 right to secure sponsorships for Centennial Farm. 2.2 We will also have the obligation to allow the 23 foundation the nonexclusive right to use the district's name and the OC Fair & Event Center logo for their 25 fundraising purposes.

1	In accordance with state law and FPPC rules,
2	we will comply with ticket distribution policies that
3	allow the foundation, in return for their efforts in
4	fundraising for Centennial Farm, to receive tickets to
5	the fair and parking at the district's sole discretion,
6	and then to allow the foundation a presence during the
7	annual OC Fair to increase awareness of the foundation
8	and Centennial Farm, and as well as space here on a
9	monthly basis to conduct their their board meetings.
10	On the other side, the foundation's
11	obligations to us as outlined in the draft would be to
12	allow district staff to serve as liaison to their
13	foundation board of directors, to focus their efforts on
14	obtaining private support for Centennial Farm, including
15	making an annual contribution of \$45,000 for offsetting
16	the operational expenses at the farm, to provide a copy
17	of an annual audit by an independent accounting firm for
18	the foundation, and then to maintain an adequate and
19	required level of insurance coverage.
20	So the draft that's in your packet will go to
21	the Centennial Farm Foundation this afternoon. We'll
22	ask them to review it, get back to us with any
23	recommended changes, and our hope is to be able to bring
24	it back for full board approval at the March meeting.
25	MR. NICK BERARDINO: I have some questions.

You know, we talked about the heroes. 17 18 That's this board, heroes on this project. And it's 19 much appreciated. 20 But I want to, with that said, keep in mind that what we do for veterans as a Board, when we say 22 we're generous, we are. And this Board's generous. 23 Nothing's more generous than men and women that sign up 24 for their lives, their entire lives so they can -- we can have a fairgrounds, so we can put on the fair.

1 It's easily forgotten because we feel like, well, we're doing all this for the vets, and it's wonderful. Because if it wasn't for this Board and this county, nothing would be done for the vets in this area. 5 And those of you out in the audience and those of you that are on this Board that have lived in this county a long time know how tough it is to get money out of this county for vets. 9 You -- and for veterans, just go back and read. Just read all the newspaper articles. 10 tough. A place so rich and so wealthy with so many 11 wealthy people, it's tough. 12 13 And I mean I just got asked to serve on the cemetery, the veterans cemetery, a thing they're trying to build at the Great Park, and I sat through my first 15 meeting. Every possible obstacle that could be put in the way by the developers and by politicians have been 17 18 thrown at these people. 19 And after sitting through that meeting -- now the biggest thing is they can't get a cemetery where 20 21 they want it because a developer, 5 Points Realty, is saying they sold -- most of their homes of the 4,000 22 23 homes were sold to Chinese nationals, some of them 24 actually sold in Beijing. 25 The people coming here from China are saying

- the feng shui is such, and that's the fight. And you
  can follow it. It's a public thing. The fight is the
  people that bought those homes are saying feng shui is
  preventing -- they don't want -- their culture doesn't
  want vets buried there. And not only that, that if
  there's a burial ceremony, it has to be conducted in a
  certain way.

  So everybody's fighting. And there's a
- So everybody's fighting. And there's a

  9 person that's running for office, and I won't say which

  10 office, but running for office in Irvine for the sole

  11 purpose of kicking -- making sure that there's no vets

  12 buried in El Toro where we all flew out of to go to war.

  13 We can't be buried there because it offends their

  14 feng shui.
- So when we do things here and you see -- I

  just want to say when I'm saying all the time about the

  greatness of this, I would hope that things that are

  necessary we need to do. If it's necessary that we pay

  this amount of money, well, I want to see the spec sheet

  on how we came to 45,000 and how much are we gonna have

  to pay. And the same goes for everything else.
- Unless you are a vet, unless you've spent
  that time in those jungles, unless -- unless you've had
  that pain, a lot of vets, unless you've seen it, you
  know, you don't get it. You don't get it.

1 So when you hear us being very passionate about it, understand anything that any one of us can do 3 isn't enough. We can never do enough. Because there 4 isn't enough to do for a young person, man or woman, at 19 years old that says "I'm gonna go die for you" dies, 5 never comes back, never has a family, never has 7 children, never has a chance to have a car or a house. So with that said, I mean I always got to 8 fight for these guys because it's a fight for vets in Orange County. It's tough here, really tough. We've 10 raised \$120,000. We have before us 80,000 of it going 11 12 out, 45,000 paying for legal fees, maybe another amount 13 of money to pay, and we have to go out and reraise that money. And let me tell you raising money here, it ain't 15 easy. So thank you to all of you for your 16 generosity. Thank you for being heroes and for 17 everything you've done. And please don't mistake the 18 idea of trying to limit the amount that we have to pay 19 20 in for this opportunity and for this monument and this museum to honor the men and women that served as being chintzy. Just trying to be sure that we're doing 22 23 everything we can do, and I just want us to do everything we can do. So thank you very much. 24 25 (Applause.)

CHAIR GERARDO MOUET: Stan? 1 DIRECTOR STAN TKACZYK: 2 I want to thank all the 3 vendors that have come here to speak to us. I really appreciate your comments and being here last month and 5 having the opportunity to talk with you after the meeting. 6 7 I hope you learned as much -- I learned as 8 much from you as I hope you learned from me. So we've set a -- let's just say a bridge to go forward. 10 we have a great opportunity in front of us now with a new face. 11 12 But I want to thank the people from Tel-Phil 13 that have been here all these years that you guys have 14 just done a remarkable job.
